Scenario 1

- Mother dies
- Father can't cope
- Children go to grandparents
- Father won't give up custody and won't allow parenting orders
- Grandparents left to compete with father over children

Guardianship - parenting orders

Grandparents' ability to care for grandchildren

Scenario 2

- Young Maori woman has a child
- Her parents assume parenting role under whangai situation
- Parents raise the child as their own





Issues

Whangai children cannot inherit under intestacy

Guardianship – daughter may not have formally given up guardianship rights

Parents have duty to both daughter and

grandchild

Scenario 3

- One child intellectually and physically disabled
- Mother cannot cope
- Grandmother steps in little financial support from parents

Child's long term emotional and financial needs

Who cares for child on grandmother's death?

Welfare guardianship v. enduring powers of attorney
