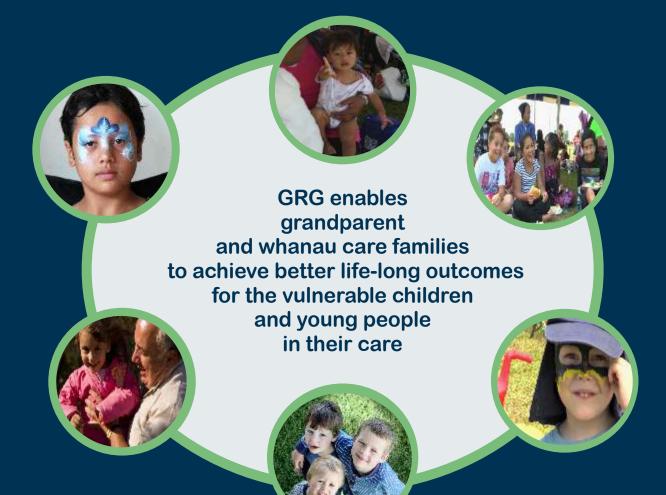

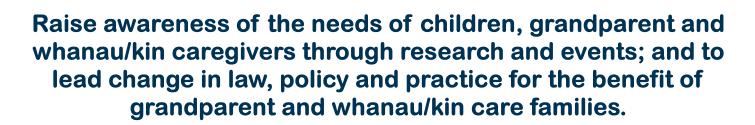

From the Chair Na te Tumuaki



As Chair, I am excited about the growth and development that GRG has experienced this past year. We have seen an additional 784 new member families being supported by our organisation compared to last year's increase of 580 new member families. This represents a 35% growth in new families subscribing to our services and means that more grandparents and kin carers are being supported in the challenging task of raising our vulnerable children.

Over the past three years we have been in a period of transition as we continue to drive towards our objectives while improving our performance and remaining accountable to our member families and generous financial supporters.

This year the Board appointed Kate Bundle as Chief Executive and her commitment to the organisation is undisputed. Kate has had 18 years of service with GRG as a trustee and recently as Business Development and Communications Manager. She is well informed and qualified to lead us, with her previous executive management experience, experience as a lawyer and past roles within GRG, as we move forward.

We also welcomed Lisa Braid as Operations Manager and Lisa brings her skills in social work management to the table. Both Kate and Lisa have worked hard to bring greater structure and accountability into our operations and as a consequence, our funding has grown substantially. We have moved into a more professional service delivery model that continues to deliver at the grass roots level and there are exciting times ahead as we continue this development. I have no doubt that as an organisation we will continue to demonstrate the value that GRG provides to New Zealand in providing support and resources to the growing number of grandparents and kin carers who are raising our vulnerable children.

As an organisation, we continue to build strong relationships with those providers who generously support the work undertaken by GRG. With the establishment of our Finance and Risk Committee, which has excellent support from our accountant and Secretariat, BPSL, we can demonstrate good financial performance and management.

We are thankful for the solid funding support that GRG has received in this past financial year and in particular we acknowledge those funders who have supported us in previous years and who continued to support us with grants in this last year – Foundation North in 2016, Lotteries, Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust, Allright Welfare Trust, Phillip Very Charitable Trusts and the COGS grants received from many communities nationwide.

We also acknowledge The Warehouse Group (TWG), as GRG was extremely fortunate to be the chosen recipient charity for the Bob Tindall Golf Classic Tournament and Charity Auction held during our 2017 Awareness Week in March. On the day the sun shone, the drizzle fell and many a sausage and burger satisfied the players' hunger. It was a fantastic day all round and for the GRG team it was wonderful to have the opportunity to give back and serve food to the people who gave so generously.

For this opportunity, we are most grateful and extend a big "thankyou" to TWG, and to the organisations and individuals who donated the prizes and supported our cause on the day.

It is also timely to recognise our Founding Trustee and the inspiration behind the organisation, Diane Vivian. As an organisation, GRG was born out of desperate need, sheer hard work and Di's determination. In recognition of her achievements she was formally recognised in the Queen's New Year Honours List for 2017. Diane was made a Companion of the Queens Service Order, and we thank her for her many years of hard work and determination and congratulate her on receiving this honour.

There are exciting and challenging times ahead and as we continue to grow in an evolving environment both the Board and the Management Team remain committed to our vision to ensure that grandparents and kin carers raising grandchildren are empowered to provide a safe, secure and nurturing home for their grandchildren and to achieving better life-long outcomes for them.

Sadly, we cannot do this without financial support and we look forward to ongoing support from funders, supporters, partners and stakeholders in achieving this goal in the year ahead.

CEO's Report

Te Ripoata a te Tumuaki Whakahaere



In my first report as CEO, I reflect on a year of sectoral change coupled with organisational developments and projects that are driving us forward in the pursuit of the Trust's purpose and objectives.

Notably last year we launched our 2016 Grandparent and Whanau Care survey.

This research project funded by a \$75,000 Lotteries research grant, became the largest survey of the social, wellbeing and economic issues affecting these families in the world to date. It has produced incredibly rich data which will be used to inform the further development of our services and those provided by other community agencies. It will also help shape policy, law and practice guidelines.

Some of the key findings from this study are outlined on page 15 of this report.

The 'first cut' of the findings published in Dr Liz Gordon's report "The empty nest is refilled: The joys and tribulations of raising grandchildren in Aotearoa" was published in October 2017.

With further support from Lotteries in the 2017/18 year we will use the huge vault of qualitative data to flesh out a range of narrower papers on themes such as: ethnicity, family circumstances, reasons for coming into care; health and education.

There is also particular interest by policymakers and the media in the experience of different groups. Drugs and alcohol issues, the impact of methamphetamine and income differentials and these issues will form the focus of further reports published in the year ahead.

The review of Child Youth and Family by the Expert Advisory Panel appointed by the Minister for Social Development, Anne Tolley culminated in several recommendations for the child welfare sector leading to the announcement that *Oranga Tamariki* (the Ministry for Vulnerable Children) would replace Child Youth and Family from 1 April 2017.

Over the past year we have actively engaged with key advisers leading the organisational changes giving shape to the new *Oranga Tamariki* framework that is dedicated to supporting any child in New Zealand whose wellbeing is at significant risk of harm now, or in the future.

Our team of staff and volunteers who have participated in the community engagement led by Ministry advisers are impressed by the passion, enthusiasm and drive to make the kinds of changes needed to achieve this goal.

We look forward to working further with *Oranga Tamariki* and other community agencies to better provide services enabling families to build safe, loving and stable relationships with the vulnerable children and young people in their care.

Our research revealed that 41% of children in grandparent care have been diagnosed with a psychological illness or disorder, which often relates to past trauma manifesting in anxiety and challenging behaviour.

Informed by this finding and the feedback from our members, we embarked on a programme to further develop our SALT 4 Caregivers (Simply Acquired and Learned Techniques) Training workshops to incorporate 'trauma informed care' modules. These workshops are designed to educate and empower the caregiver with an insight into what triggers troubling behaviour, how to de-escalate situations before they become a crisis, and strategies for effective parenting. Our programme uniquely caters for the grandparent care family dynamic; recognising the familial links, potential conflict, pressures and issues that can arise for caregivers within the wider family/whanau. The programme has been enthusiastically received to date (see page 14 for feedback).

The Trust was honoured to be the beneficiary of The Warehouse Group's (TWG) Annual Bob Tindall Golf Classic Tournament and Charity Auction at Muriwai golf course this year which was held during our Awareness Week in March 2017. We were delighted and grateful for the support shown for our work by the players and companies involved who raised \$76,000, and to TWG, Seven Events Ltd, Muriwai Golf Club, Education Action, our volunteers, Trustees and staff who worked hard to make the day such a success. These funds will contribute towards the cost of rolling out our SALT workshop programme to many more caregivers nationwide and to support the further development of our community outreach programme so that we can better support grandparent and whanau care families with complex needs.

In the coming year, we are focused on the implementation of a more robust outcomes evaluation framework and case management system, tracking our work with member families, our partnerships with other community providers and funders through to desired outcomes.

I am excited by the challenge, leading these organisational changes and improvements to our services and continue to be inspired by the commitment and passion shown by our volunteers and staff working with our families in their local communities and thankful for the support, insight and guidance from our Board of Trustees.

I look forward to working collaboratively with them and many others in the community in the year ahead to help enable grandparent and whanau caregivers to achieve better life-long outcomes for the vulnerable children and young people in their care.

Finally, we couldn't do this work without the support of our wonderful private donors, supporters and funders. On behalf of the grandparent and whanau care families benefitting from our services, our Board, staff and volunteers - thank you for your invaluable support.

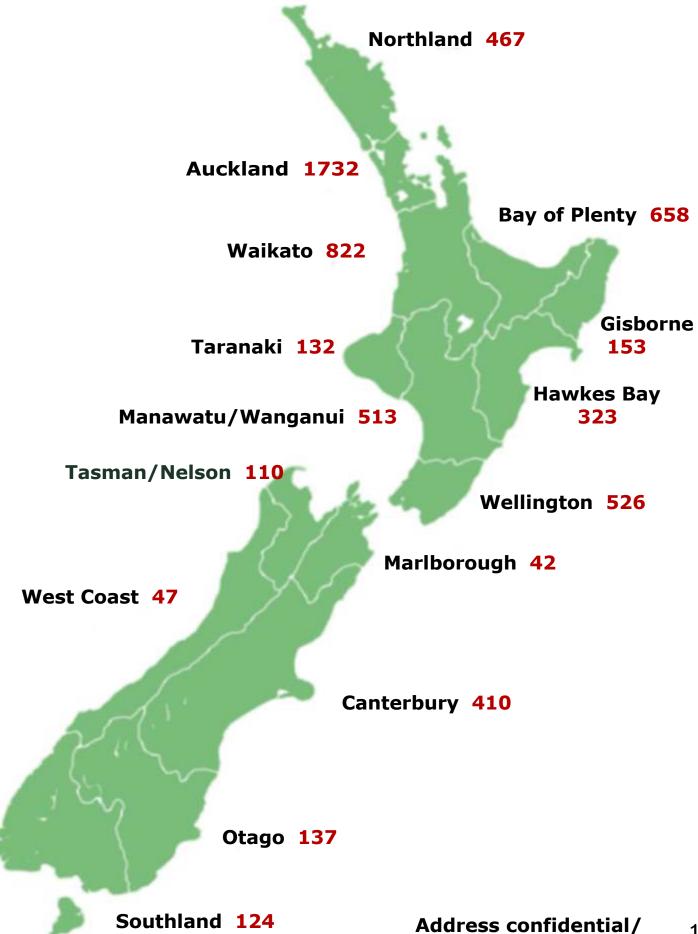

Statement of Service Performance for the year ended 31 March 2017

We supported 3,693 member families raising over 6,500 vulnerable children and young people, helping them to reduce stress and maximise stability in their lives through our support services.

94% of member clients reported that, overall, our support services met their needs



784 new member families benefited from our New Caregiver Resource packs with information and the Parenting Toolbox DVDs to help them promote the wellbeing and best interests of the children they are raising.

98% of our caregivers surveyed said they found our New Caregiver Resource packs helpful or very helpful.



43,709 newsletters were distributed to grandparent and whanau caregivers, stakeholders and other professionals in the child welfare sector

96% of our member clients reported that some or all of the items in our Grands Report newsletters match their interests.



We successfully assisted 31 clients to claim arrears of over \$537,000 in income support payments that they would have received if their original application had been granted.

90% of member clients reported our outreach and advocacy staff successfully advocated on their behalf.



Our 0800 GRANDS free Helpline service and community support and advocacy staff fielded 8,744 calls assisting members with their queries and concerns.

92% of our members reported they were satisfied or very satisfied with the service they received via our Helpline.

As a result of contacting our 0800 Helpline, 96% say they now understand more clearly how to access the help they need in future.



98 member clients were successfully granted the Unsupported Child Benefit with our assistance after initially being declined or incorrectly advised by Work and Income staff that they did not qualify for this financial support to help with the cost of raising the children in their care.



Our Community Outreach, Support and Advocacy staff liaised with an average of 73 agencies each month on behalf of members to address client needs and objectives for further support.

94% of our member clients reported they are satisfied or very satisfied with the service they received through our community outreach and advocacy service.

6,953 member contacts were made with our Support Services Delivery team in the past year - an average of 579 clients being helped with their needs and objectives each month.

Providing Respite for Grandparent and Whanau caregivers

41 children and young people were sponsored to attend school holiday camps in the past year and over 150 children's applications were facilitated into Government -funded school holiday camp programmes providing respite for their caregivers and a fun, challenging and inspiring camp experience for the children.

Firstly thank you very much for the opportunity that your team gave my grandchildren at their first ever camp. I have been raising many of my grandchildren for years and have never had a week-long break from them ever. Caregiver Training and Education

In the past year our caregiver training included our 4th National Caregivers and Members Summit: *Hear Our Voices* at the Novotel, Ellerslie, in Auckland on 7-8 September 2016 and a number of workshops. The Summit programme coincided with the release of the findings of our 2016 Grandparent and Whanau Care Survey in which over 1,100 caregivers nationwide had their say on the social and economic issues affecting them in their roles raising some of New Zealand's most vulnerable children and young people.

The study revealed that 41% of children in grandparent and whanau care have been diagnosed with a psychological or cognitive processing disorder or disability. 67% of caregivers reported that they cared for children with behavioural problems. There is growing awareness of the impact of trauma on children and a corresponding need to equip caregivers with the understanding and practical strategies to effectively manage troubling behaviour and at the same time provide the stability these children need in order to overcome past trauma and feel a sense of security in their lives. These issues are addressed in our SALT (Simply Acquired and Learned Techniques™) 'Trauma informed care' workshop programmes.

145 caregivers attended our caregiver training workshops and summit programmes last year gaining insights into the impact of trauma on children and learning strategies for managing the troubling and challenging behaviour they exhibit.

99% of our attendees at our caregiver training workshops and summit programmes last year reported that the information they learned at the programmes was useful or very useful for them.

- "I feel this is a great programme and definitely beneficial. It was presented in a "user friendly" way and easily able to relate to my own personal situation."
- "This was a real eye-opener and I am definitely going to put this knowledge into practice. It makes sense and I am able to relate to it."
- "Very relevant. All modules were important and relevant, very useful especially in dealing with anger issues enjoyed the whole programme."
- "Great when's the next one? Enjoyed all the modules made me think about ways to improve communication with my granddaughter."
- "Excellent we need more of this in GRG."

Support Group Co-ordinator still supporting her."

Our Research

Last year, with the support of a grant from the Lotteries Community Sector Research Fund, our research team launched a comprehensive nationwide survey of grandparents and whanau caregivers who are raising someone else's child.

Over 1,000 families raising 1,750 children responded in what is, to date, the largest survey of its type worldwide.

A large amount of qualitative data was collected on the social and economic issues affecting these caregivers.

The 'first cut' of the data was discussed at our *4th National Members and Caregivers Summit 2016: Hear Our Voices* in September. Dr Liz Gordon of Pukeko Research Ltd, our lead researcher completed her first report, "*The empty nest is refilled: The joys and tribulations of raising grandchildren in Aotearoa*" which was published in October 2016.

The findings have been reported widely in the media and since presented at the *International Coalition for Children of Incarcerated Parents (INCCIP)* inaugural international conference held in Rotorua at which delegates from 19 countries and 5 continents attended, and at **Age Concern NZ's Conference** in Wellington, both in March 2017.

The overview in this first report demonstrated a huge diversity of experiences among and between the families. The participants threw themselves into telling their stories with a number of the questions eliciting well in excess of 20,000 words, only a fraction of which have so far been published.

It is important that the voices and stories collected and heard during the research process are not lost. We feel we have an ethical as well as an organisational imperative to undertake a further 'drill down' into data to ensure these voices are heard.

Further reports in the year ahead are being worked on to provide an examination of the grandparents' experiences with Work and Income, great grandparents who look after children, the implications of grandparents taking babies into their care, the data relating to 'drug addicted' parents, the social and economic issues for all Māori, for children with incarcerated parents and the effects of differential income circumstances on grandparent families, comparing sole and partnered grandparent families.

12% of NZ's grandparent care population took part in the survey

55-59yrs is average age of caregivers each raising an average 1.8 children

48% are employed or self-employed, 16% retired and 37% unemployed

70% receive financial support from the Unsupported Child Benefit

43% of caregivers in receipt of national super

Median family income after tax was around \$40-\$50,000.

36% of partnered caregivers and 63% of sole caregivers live in rented homes.

49% of partnered families owned their own home compared to 27% for sole caregivers.

73% of caregivers have health problems affecting their lives, with 70% saying they felt under stress

For 72% of children there was some involvement with Child Youth and Family

41% of children had diagnosed psychological problems with an average 1.63 diagnoses per child

14% of caregivers have been physically assaulted by children in their care

64% have experienced verbal abuse from the children's families

Drug addiction (43%) cited as most prevalent reason for children going into grandparent or whanau care with alcohol abuse cited as cause in 25% of cases.

71% of respondents to the survey cited Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust as a community support for them

Basis of Preparation

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust New Zealand has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

The Performance Report is comprised of Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust New Zealand and its Support Groups which are located in Rotorua, Invercargill, Wairarapa and Wellington. Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust New Zealand controls these Support Groups on the basis that Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust New Zealand can derive benefits and direct the operating decisions of these Support Groups.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust New Zealand is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax, having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Short term investments

Short term investments maturing beyond 90 days but less than 12 months are shown as Current Assets in the Statement of Financial Position.

Statement of Cash Flows

The Statement of Cash Flows is prepared exclusive of GST, which is consistent with the direct method.

The following are definitions of the terms used in the Statement of Cash Flows:

- (a) Cash is considered to be cash on hand, current accounts in banks, and other highly liquid investments (such as term investments) in which the entity invests as part of its day-to-day cash management.
- (b) Investing activities are those activities relating to the acquisition, holding and disposal of fixed assets and of investments. Investments can include securities not falling within the definition of cash.
- (c) Operating activities includes all transactions and other events that are not financing or investing activities.
- (d) The reconciliation of the surplus (deficit) after tax with the net cash flow from operating activities is set out in the Statement of Cash Flows.
- (e) The cash flow statement includes the cash movements for the Support Groups, which were consolidated for the first time in 2016.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised in the period in which it is derived, unless there are specific conditions related to the grant whereby any unused portion of the grant may be carried forward into the next financial year as Income Received in Advance.

Support Group Reserve

To ensure transparency of funding received by Head Office on behalf of Support Groups, any unused portion of grants or donations received which do not have a specific "use or return" condition are transferred to a Reserve account at year-end.

Property, Plant and Equipment

The entity has the following classes of Property, Plant and Equipment:

Furniture and Fittings 16% DV

Computers (including Software) 50% DV

All property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated in accordance with rates permitted under the Income Tax Act 2007.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes to accounting policies for the current year.
